This is of course the risky business of Coal Seam Gas (CSG) mining in residential areas.

"Predicting long-term impacts of CSG production can be difficult due to potential cumulative and region-specific impacts of multiple developments."

"Extraction of large volumes of groundwater may also cause some surface subsidence, depending on the site."

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The real issue looks to be that CSG has been put into action before it has been properly studied and effects recorded. I have yet to find a peer reviewed article on the impact of CSG that wasn't funded by a business with a vested interest.

CSG is going ahead at a blistering pace and the government needs to pause it to catch up and institute laws around this practice; if we knew that CSG was safe before it was put into action, there would be a lot less debate and uproar about the topic.

It has been stated that 22,000 litres a day are used by a well. In a country like Australia that is constantly fighting droughts, this doesn't bode well for our future.

The potential for polluting water ways and soil in a way that can severely affect the health of locals, is too great to justify the action. Instead, funding R & D into finding more sustainable, efficient and safer energy sources should be the focus.
